### Legislative Bills Signed into Law by Governor:

- <u>House Bill 14</u> SCHOOL RECORDS-ABUSED-NEGLECTED-DEPENDENT CHILD - With respect to a school district's withholding or transfer to another district or school of the records of a child who is alleged or adjudicated an abused, neglected, or dependent child.
- <u>Senate Bill 21</u> THIRD-GRADE READING GUARANTEE To revise the requirements for reading teachers under the Third-Grade Reading Guarantee.
- <u>Senate Bill 26</u> HEAD INJURIES-YOUTH SPORTS To correct a cross reference with regard to concussions and head injuries in athletic activities organized by youth sports organizations and to declare an emergency.
