Hamilton Participates in Field Testing New School Assessments - Ohio students are getting a taste of the new exams they'll be taking in coming years as the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) launched field testing Monday for assessments tied to more rigorous learning standards.

Tests aligned to the Common Core standards in math and English and developed by Pearson Inc. are being administered as part of Ohio's participation in the Partnership for Assessments of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC). Ohio adopted its own standards for science and social studies apart from Common Core and contracted with the American Institutes for Research (AIR) to develop those assessments.

Field-testing of the PARCC assessments runs from Monday through Friday, April 11; testing extends until April 18 for the AIR assessments of Ohio's science and social studies standards.

For this first testing window, schools are administering the performance-based sections of the assessments, which are meant for students to demonstrate how they can apply their understanding of academic content. The sections, akin to essay sections on earlier tests, take longer to score and so are being administered first.

A second round of field-testing, for end-of-year sections consisting mostly of multiple choice questions, will take place Monday, May 5 through Friday, June 6.

Two sections of Algebra II at Hamilton Township High School will be participating in the field tests. Math teachers and instructional technology staff were trained on April 3 to administer these computer-based tests. Students will take the first round of testing on April 10 & 11.

Field-testing of the computer-based exams is hoped to give a fuller picture of Ohio schools' technological capabilities. ODE Chief of Staff Jason Rafeld told State Board of Education members earlier this month that while department surveys of connectivity and computing power showed a rosier picture than initially expected, field-testing will determine how those surveys match with reality.

House Bill (HB)193 would push PARCC tests back to the 2015-2016 school year - Doubt about schools' technological capacity is a factor in calls by the Ohio House to delay administration of the PARCC assessments. In January, the House overwhelmingly passed HB193 (Brenner), which would push administration of the PARCC tests back to the 2015-2016 school year, reduce the number of end-of-course exams required for a high school diploma, and require ODE to conduct a comprehensive survey of schools' ability to administer online tests.

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Third Grade Reading Alternative Assessments announcements - The Ohio Department of Education recently announced the approval of three alternative assessments for students who do not meet or exceed the promotion score on the Ohio Achievement Assessment for reading as required by the Third Grade Reading Guarantee. The approved assessments are:

- Iowa Assessments Form F Level 9 (Grade 3)
- Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) Measurement of Academic Progress (MAP)
- Terra Nova 3

According to the Third Grade Reading Guarantee, the alternative assessment for reading will align to end-of-year third grade standards. A student must achieve the accepted third grade level of achievement as designated by the assessment. This may be comparable or more rigorous than the Ohio Achievement Assessment for reading.

Districts can determine when they administer the alternative assessment during the student's third grade year, which includes the summer. The alternative assessment may only be used for promotion purposes if a student has not reached the promotion score on the third grade Ohio Achievement Assessment for reading.

Education Committee Reports Out K-12 MBR Bill - The House Education Committee Thursday afternoon reported out the K-12 mid-biennium review (MBR) bill, HB487 (Brenner), by a vote of 13-4. The vote came after the unanimous adoption of an omnibus amendment, which encompassed 30 different amendments. Among the changes approved through the omnibus pertaining to PK-12 education are the following:

- Permits students enrolled in community schools to have access to extracurricular activities in the district of residence.
- Makes the following changes to the College Credit Plus (CC+) Program: permits school districts to negotiate agreements below the \$40/credit hour floor; permits seventh and eighth graders to participate; and permits out-of-state colleges whose programs are approved by the Board of Regents to participate.
- Specifies that students cannot be counted as "served" under the Operating Standards for Identifying and Serving Gifted Students if they are charged for the course
- Amends HB215 (DeVitis) bill into HB487. This addresses law enforcement volunteering in schools.
- Delays the effective date by one year for the seventh and eighth grade career

technical education; and career advising and dropout recovery waiver changes; and delays the deadline for the career advising policy from September 2014 to December 2014.

- Makes EdChoice and Cleveland Scholarship students subject to retention under the third grade reading guarantee.
- Revises the calculation for the value-added progress measure on the school and district report card to use only the most recent school year instead of up to three years of data, and specifies that only data from students who have been enrolled and assessed by that school for two years or more be used.
