Superintendent's Weekly Wrap-up: Dec. 6-13, 2013

Hamilton Intermediate Celebrates Earning Second Consecutive School of Honor Award from ODE - Last week, I mentioned that our students and team at Hamilton Intermediate School earned the School of Honor designation from ODE for the second straight year. There were only two public elementary-level schools in the entire state to be selected in back-to-back years.

Last year, state superintendent of public instruction Dr. Richard A. Ross launched the statewide Schools of Honor recognition program at Hamilton Intermediate School, and those students, teachers and administrators can celebrate their successes again this year.

This state recognition is the most recent of many that our students, faculty and staff have earned based on their academic performance during the 2012-13 school year. We have so much to be proud of throughout our district and enjoy celebrating our successes, but make no mistake; we are focused on continuing our mission of "Improving Achievement through Total Accountability and High Expectations."

Again, congratulations to Hamilton Intermediate School on being named an Ohio School of Honor.

To Close, Delay, or Early Dismiss...What's The Process? - Our district staff understands that our decision to open or close schools in inclement weather has a big effect on families. We also understand that our students are better served – academically and socially – by being in school. But, as always, our top priority is the safety and health of our students and employees.

HOW DO WE MAKE OUR DECISION?

We make the decision to delay or close our schools in bad weather based on a careful analysis of all relevant factors including, but not limited to:

- Current road conditions
- Current accumulations of snow and/or ice
- Current temperature & wind chill
- Local weather forecasts
- Conditions of buildings and parking lots
- What neighboring school districts are doing

WHO MAKES THE DECISION?

Prior to making a final decision on whether to open or close school, our District Superintendent may consult with our Assistant Superintendent, Director of Maintenance & Transportation, and employees that reside in our school district.

HOW IS THE PUBLIC NOTIFIED?

We make every effort to communicate accurate and timely notification of school closings, delays through the use of our district wide call system, <u>our website</u>, <u>Facebook</u> & Twitter, and by contacting local TV and radio stations:

WHEN IS THE DECISION MADE?

Every attempt is made to make a decision by 6:00 a.m. or earlier. We are aware that making a decision the night before is better for everyone involved, but we have to make certain that conditions warrant the need for a delay or closing. Due to that fact, we may not be able to make the decision until the actual morning of the day in question.

Once a decision has been made, our Superintendent notifies the district's Director of Public Relations and gives the direction to alert parents and students, employees, local news media, and update our web and social media sites.

WHAT DETERMINES A TWO-HOUR DELAY?

At times, by living in Central Ohio, we are exposed to extreme weather conditions that include large quantities of snow, extreme wind chills, or extended days of temperatures below freezing. That being said, our district could be on a two-hour delay for several different reasons; the most common is due to winter weather.

Depending on the amount of snow, ice, sleet, or forecast/registered wind chill*, our district could activate a two-hour delay. This allows us to further evaluate the impact of the weather to determine if we need to close the district or continue operating on a two-hour delay schedule. A two-hour delay provides us with an opportunity to keep our students who ride buses or walk to school out of the elements when they are at their harshest.

A two-hour delay also gives us time to check our buses and make certain they will start and that all systems are working because extreme cold temperatures can impact our transportation fleet in different ways.

* Our Superintendent begins looking closely at forecasts that include wind chill warnings that could surpass -10 degrees as a baseline for initiating a two-hour delay. This isn't to say that a wind chill of -10 degrees automatically delays the start of school.

NEVER PRESUME THAT WE ARE GOING TO BE DELAYED OR CLOSED Our district will ALWAYS notify students, parents, and employees when a delay or closing has been initiated by using the phone and media vehicles previously mentioned. Unless you hear something from our district, always presume that school is in session and our district is operating on a regular schedule.

WHAT HAPPENS IF WINTER WEATHER MOVES IN DURING THE SCHOOL DAY? If weather moves into the area during the school day, and our district is prompted to dismiss students early in order for them to make it home as safely as possible, the following dismissal schedule is most frequently utilized. Again, this dismissal schedule could be changed at the discretion of our district Superintendent.

Example Dismissal Schedule – (Could be altered by Superintendent)

- HTHS students that drive will be released 75 minutes early from school.
- HTHS and Hamilton Middle School Bus Riders will be released 60 minutes early.
- Hamilton Intermediate School Bus Riders will be released 15 minutes early.
- Hamilton Elementary School Bus Riders will be released on time.

This schedule allows our student drivers to clear the roads prior to our buses hauling students. The gaps between release times are made so buses can take their time

transporting students putting a priority on the safety of our students, and it also helps with traffic flow related to parents picking their children up at different buildings.

We hope this information helps you understand how we come to these decisions and that you know that our goal is to keep students and employees safe during winter weather conditions.

Senate Recesses for Holidays - On Wednesday, December 4, the Ohio Senate wrapped up a week earlier than anticipated and is now in recess through the holidays. The House was in session this week, along with several committee meetings before recessing for the holiday break.

House Education Committee

- HB 113 is legislation that would allow school districts to excuse students who participate in a school-sponsored athletic club from high school physical education. The legislation was voted out of committee and now awaits action by the full House.
- HB 181 is legislation that seeks to prohibit submitting a student's personal identifiable information to the federal government without the direct authorization of the local school board. The committee passed the bill out of committee on Wednesday.
- HB 193 is legislation that would revise high school diploma requirements, including state-administered assessments. The committee delayed consideration of 20 or more possible amendments until a later hearing.
- HB 334 is legislation seeking to allow a school district to adopt a policy to expel a student based on actions or information that may endanger the health and safety of other students or school employees. The committee heard from several opponents of the legislation on both Monday and Wednesday, who cited concerns over a disproportionate use of expulsions for minority and disadvantaged students. The committee did not take any action on the bill.

Senate Education Committee

- SB 229 seeks to modify some requirements under the Ohio Teacher Evaluation System to allow school districts more flexibility. Some of these modifications include changing the student academic growth factor from 50% to 35% of a teacher's performance evaluation, but allowing an additional 15% to be used should a school choose to do so. The bill also allows more flexibility in the number of evaluations to be required based on a teacher's rating. Following some technical amendments, the bill was voted out of committee. On Wednesday, December 4, the bill was passed unanimously by the full Senate and now heads to the House for committee hearings and consideration.
- SB 239 is legislation that is similar to HB 334, and would allow a school district to adopt a policy to expel a student based on a potential threat or action that may present a danger to students and staff.
- SB 167 is legislation that would modify zero-tolerance policies and require a school board to adopt a policy that allows many factors to be considered prior to the suspension or expulsion of a student.

UPDATE: House Bill 193 will Delay Online Assessments - Earlier this week, the Ohio House Education Committee adopted 27 amendments to House Bill (HB) 193, legislation that makes changes to Ohio's graduation requirements. The bill was then passed by the

committee in a bipartisan manner. Some of the changes include:

- delaying online assessments until the 2015-16 school year;
- delaying the phase-out of the Ohio Graduation Test (OGT) so students entering ninth grade after July 1, 2015, will be subject to the new graduation requirements; and
- establishing a "safe harbor" provision regarding sanctions for schools and districts for the 2014-15 school year.

HB 193 will go to the full House for a vote after they return from their holiday recess.

OFFICE OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

Health and Safety - Hamilton Schools have been awarded the School Security Grant Program's security entrance system grant. Districts can receive up to \$5,000 per building for a security entrance system consisting of security cameras, intercoms and remote access equipment.

Mr. Morrison prepared our grants for submission and was notified on Wednesday that our high school, middle school, intermediate school, elementary school and alternative academy have all been approved for reimbursement for the new security systems that were installed this summer

New security cameras and access controls were installed in each building this summer. hese controls give building staff the ability to monitor and confirm all visitors to our schools. This grant will cover costs associated with these security additions.

• The total grant amount awarded to Hamilton Local Schools is approximately \$35,000.

Maintenance - Thanks again to our maintenance staff, lead by Scott Ayers, and our building custodians for addressing the harsh winter weather earlier this week. Even with the additional snowfall, our buildings were ready for business, with access roads, sidewalks and parking areas clear and safe.
