Superintendent's Weekly Wrap-up: Nov. 29 - Dec. 6, 2013

Hamilton Intermediate School Recognized by State Superintendent as a School of Honor for Second Straight Year - Intermediate Principal, J. Michael Meade, received notice yesterday from State Superintendent, Richard Ross, that his Hamilton Intermediate building was one of only 37 school buildings in Ohio to be recognized as a High Progress School of Honor by the Ohio Department of Education.

"High Progress Schools of Honor establish an educational goal for their students and continue to pursue and exceed that goal each year," said Dr. Richard A. Ross, superintendent of public instruction. "The principals, teachers, parents and community members provide a high-quality education and believe that children can overcome significant challenges, and that they can learn."

Letter to Principal Meade from Superintendent Ross:

Dear Principal Meade:

I am happy to share the good news that the Ohio Department of Education has named Hamilton Intermediate School a High Progress School of Honor, based on your 2012-2013 Local Report Card.

To become a High Progress School of Honor a building must first be a Title 1 or Title 1-eligible schools with at least 40 percent of its students eligible for free and reduced-price meals. In addition these schools must rank in the top 10 percent for gains in proficiency, or if high schools, in the top 10 percent in graduation rates. Finally, High Progress Schools of Honor must have an Annual Measurable Objectives grade of C or higher and have met or exceeded Ohio's value-added measure for the last three years.

Clearly your school is doing whatever it takes to make sure that your students from all backgrounds have the opportunity to achieve academically. This makes you an outstanding example of what is possible when students, educators, parents and community members work together believing that all students can succeed. Please share my thanks with all of those who contributed to your school's success. I hope you will share your strategies generously with other Ohio schools.

Congratulations and my very best wishes for continued success. I know the determination and compassion for students that led to your school's success will continue to make you an asset to your community.

Only 6 school buildings in Franklin County received the High Progress School of Honor award, two of which were community schools. The other four were comprised of Hamilton Intermediate (Hamilton Local), Goshen Lane Elementary School (Gahanna-Jefferson City), Brookside Elementary School (Worthington City), and Huber Ridge Elementary School (Westerville City).

All 37 of Ohio's High Progress Schools of Honor have these distinguishing characteristics:

- Score in the top 10 percent of schools as ranked by combined gains in student achievement in reading and mathematics across all tested grade levels during the previous five-year period.
- Met or exceeded the Ohio Value-Added measure of student growth for the three most recent years.
- Had a Local Report Card rating of Effective or higher (Hamilton Intermediate is rated "Excellent with Distinction")
- Met Adequate Yearly Progress.

Substitute Bill Regarding Teacher Performance Evaluations Reported Out -

Senate Bill (SB) 229 Substitute Bill Regarding Teacher Performance Evaluations Accepted and Reported Out on Tuesday, December 2 with Bipartisan Support. The changes in the sub bill include the following:

- Reforms would begin July 1, 2014. Any changes do not occur during the current school year.
- All teachers who achieve a "skilled" or "accomplished" rating may participate in the new flexibility offered by SB229.
- Following the reduction to 35 percent of the mandated student growth measure for Ohio Teacher Evaluation System (OTES) evaluations, the law will allow local school districts to utilize any measures it deems appropriate with the new 15 percent flexibility provision. These measures may include but are not be limited to teacher evaluation components, student growth data, student surveys and other measures.
- Adds a provision that requires "that in non-OTES years for 'skilled' and 'accomplished' teachers, a minimum of one observation and one evaluator-teacher conference must be conducted. Additional measures, as the district may decide, may include student surveys, teacher self-evaluations, student growth data or other measures.

House Education Committee Considers House Bill (HB) 193 and HB 334 -

The Ohio House Education Committee met during the week of November 18-22. Legislation discussed on Monday included House Bill (HB) 193, HB 334 and HB 342.

HB 193 is legislation seeking to revise high school diploma requirements, including state-administered assessments. During the hearing, the Ohio Council of Social Studies shared concerns that the bill might lead to less of an emphasis on social studies when budgets are cut or in times of stress.

HB 334 is legislation that would allow a school district to adopt a policy to expel a student based on actions or information that may endanger the health and safety of other students or school employees.

Senate Education Committee Considers Senate Bill (SB) 220 - Senate Education Committee met the week of November 18-22 and heard testimony on Senate Bill (SB) 220. The SB 220 legislation seeks to remove the prohibition on charging students fees for participating in dual enrollment programs or in alternative funding arrangements under the Postsecondary Enrollment Options program.

Health and Safety - Thanks to a provision in the state budget, Ohio's school districts can now apply for a new grant aiming to make their buildings safer. Districts can receive up to \$2,000 per building for a radio system that will directly connect them with emergency responders.

Mr. Morrison prepared our grants for submission and was notified on Tuesday that our high school, middle school, intermediate school, elementary school and alternative academy have all been approved for a new MARCS emergency system.

MARCS (Multi-Agency Radio Communication System) is a 700/800 MHz radio and data network that utilizes state-of-the-art trunked technology to provide statewide interoperability in digital clarity to its subscribers throughout Ohio and a 10-mile radius outside of Ohio. The MARCS system provides statewide, secure, reliable public service wireless communication for public safety and first responders.
