Office of Exceptional Children Seeks Applications for SAPEC - The Individuals with Disabilities Education and Improvement Act (IDEA 2004) requires State Education Agencies to establish a State Advisory Panel. The Ohio Department of Education's State Advisory Panel for Exceptional Children (SAPEC) is seeking nominations for membership for a three year term beginning July, 1, 2011. We are requesting your assistance with identifying potential members for this panel. We are seeking members who are individuals with disabilities, teachers, representatives of an institution of higher education and representatives of a vocational, community or business organizations concerned with the transition of children with disabilities.

SAPEC's purpose is to provide broad based input to the Office for Exceptional Children (OEC) regarding policies, practices and issues related to the education of children and youth with disabilities who are between the ages of birth through twenty-one. In addition to the required federal mandates for State Advisory Panel members, SAPEC will investigate best practices and anticipate future needs for special education in Ohio. OEC's goal is to establish an active State Advisory Panel with broad representation from across the state to advise the OEC on issues related to Ohio's state performance plan, state improvement grants, OEC's General Supervision responsibilities, effective implementation of IDEA Regulations and other initiatives designed to improve outcomes for all children with disabilities.

State Advisory Panel membership, as prescribed in IDEA, includes a variety of constituents which are listed in the attached membership application. The majority of members must be individuals with disabilities or parents of children with disabilities ages of birth through 26. Please review the membership requirements listed on the attached application. If you are interested in seeking membership on the SAPEC, please complete the application and submit it along with the requested information by **no later than Feb.**28, 2011 in order to be considered for membership in 2011-2012. Also, please forward this information and application to others who meet these requirements and may be interested in serving on the panel.

All applications will be reviewed by the SAPEC membership committee and recommendations for membership will be presented to SAPEC members and the Director of the OEC for final approval during the April 2011 SAPEC meeting. Appointments to the panel will be made by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

### OFFICE OF ALTERNATIVE PROGRAMS

OhioLearns Offers High School Students Online Advanced Placement (AP) Classes - Since September, the program has expanded its grade 9 to 12 offerings to include courses in core content areas as well as credit recovery courses. A total of 237 online courses are now available for high school students. (www.ohiolearns.org)

The OhioLearns high school program was launched with an initial focus on AP courses due to one-time state funding of \$1 million for students to take AP courses online. Fee waiver opportunities for the 40 OhioLearns AP courses for both second semester this school year and throughout 2011-2012 are still available. Students who are eligible for AP courses at public schools may apply for fee waivers to assist with the cost of AP distance learning courses. To be eligible for the fee waiver, a student must be registered by a local school counselor or official who ascertains that the school will accept the grade and credit for the course. The fee waiver provides free tuition for the course, but does not cover books, lab fees or the AP exam.

OhioLearns began in 1999 as the Gateway to Distance Learning in Ohio for anyone interested in college-level, distance-learning courses and degrees from the state's two-and four-year colleges and universities. The addition of high school courses to Ohio Learns was established by the Ohio Board of Regents and is administered in collaboration with eTech Ohio by the Ohio Learning Network, an Ohio higher education consortium. **Leader Alert -** When we tried to make the all-call that our district was closed on Tuesday, Feb. 1st, our automated system didn't work properly when initiating the calls. Their system sent out the calls to some of you, but not all. We send out the original closing call to staff at on Tuesday morning at 5:22 a.m. with the call going out to our students at 5:23 a.m. After realizing not everyone received the original call, we sent a second call at 5:36 a.m. for staff and 5:44 a.m. for students. The Leader Alert system finally distributed the all-call at approx. 7:30 a.m. Tuesday morning once they resolved their technical issues. We are researching to see if there is a similar communications product on the market that is more reliable.

Our complete staff list was called at 5:47 a.m. and was completed within three minutes of it being initiated on Wednesday morning. Our student calls began at 5:50 a.m. and the 2,300 calls were complete by 5:55 a.m.

If you believe we may be closed or on a 2-hr delay, and don't receive a call from us, there are many areas where you can find this information. Mr. Payne verifies that our information is included in all of the local news channel "info crawls" at the bottom of the screen, he contacts all of the highest rated radio stations in the area, along with posting it to our Twitter account (HamiltonLocalSD) and district Facebook group.

**SMART Exchange**: Many of you already take advantage of the wonderful resources available at SMART's exchange website. If you haven't checked it out yet, it is definitely worth the time. The site hosts pre-made lessons for SMART Notebook as well as SMART Response. Teachers can browse by grade, subject, or file type. #### OFFICE OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

**Health and Safety** - In accordance with state law (Ohio Senate Bill 210) and as part of our continuing effort to help ensure our students' health, we are completing Body Mass Index measurements for students in grades K, 3, 5, and 9. Body Mass Index (BMI) is a measure of body heaviness and an indirect measure of body fat. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, a BMI at or above the 85th percentile, or lower than the 5th percentile may be a health risk for your child. This is a screening and is not intended to be diagnostic. The purpose of the screening is to identify students who should follow up with their doctor to determine if there is any need for concern.

If you have questions, do not have a doctor or health insurance for your child, would like information on available community resources or would like to discuss these results with the school nurse, please contact our school nurse, Mrs. Kathy Brickey, at 491-8044, ext.1810.

Our high school and middle school teachers have been enrolled in an online class that will help them identify and provide support for students dealing with dating violence. The course will help our staff to recognize signs of dating violence and show them how to deal with both the victim and the perpetrator.

**Residency** - Mr. Yonnotti and Mr. Stevens continue to check numerous residency issues. It is our goal to investigate all concerns regarding students attending Hamilton Schools living outside of our district. When students are suspected of living outside of our district boundaries, Mr. Stevens and Mr. Yonnotti investigate the residence. Parents are then asked to provide proof of residency. If residency cannot be proven, we are required to withdraw the children in question.

### OFFICE OF TEACHING AND LEARNING

**EXPLORE, PLAN, ACT** - As part of our post-secondary readiness efforts the district is encourages all students, starting in junior year, to take the ACT, which is the most widely accepted college entrance exam. The ACT assesses general educational development and ability to complete college level work and is used by colleges to help make admissions and scholarship decisions. In preparation for the ACT, sophomores take the PLAN. The PLAN test measures current academic development, explores career/training options, and helps with planning for the remainder of high school and post-secondary years. Beginning this year, eighth graders will take two additional ACT assessments: EXPLORE and the Student Readiness Inventory (SRI). The EXPLORE test indicates if students are on the right track for college, helps guide course selection in high school, matches careers with areas of interest, and identifies areas for needed improvement. The SRI provides information on risk factors that may interfere with students' future success, such as school attendance and work habits. We believe the ongoing monitoring of students' college readiness and the opportunity to more readily adjust to student needs will result in better-prepared students. Research shows that students who begin the testing series in grade eight perform better on the ACT.

South High Library Offers Homework Help and More - In the South High Library Homework Help Center students will find everything they need to complete their homework -- friendly volunteers, computers, on-site school supplies and a welcoming atmosphere for studying and learning. The library also hosts a number of story times each week, and each summer it hosts summer reading clubs for children, teens and adults. The branch offers regular teen programs and a Job Help Center. In addition to its book collection, the library has many computers with word processing capabilities and access to the Internet. They also provide access to an extensive collection of electronic databases, which offer a wealth of information. The South High Branch is located just north of the Great Southern Shopping Center and across the street from Wendy's at 3540 S. High Street. More information is available by phone at 645-2ASK (2275). She works with students in a variety of settings-one on one, small group, and in an inclusion setting. She is also a great resource to all of the preschool teachers.

**ODE Inspection -** Chip Geckleler from the Ohio Department of Education spent two hours on Friday, February 4, 2011 reviewing required documentation for licensing purposes. He was really impressed with the facilities, curriculum, and organization of the preschool.
