Study of District Spending Comparisons Provide Further Evidence that Hamilton Residents Get More for Their Tax Dollar - Three school leadership groups released an analysis Tuesday by education funding expert Howard Fleeter that examines how much school districts' spending varies when taking into account high-need students, and suggests that the state gives too little weight to the added costs of teaching impoverished children.

The analysis builds on the Ohio Department of Education's Fiscal Data Project, which includes an "expenditure per equivalent pupil" measure that attempts to account for the costs of education of children who are economically disadvantaged, limited-English proficient or in need of special education services.

"By making this adjustment, the equivalent expenditure per pupil figure reflects the amount that each district has to spend on the typical student. While the ODE methodology is generally sound, the weight used for economically disadvantaged students appears to be too low," Fleeter writes, citing Gates Foundation research on California's school finance system.

Hamilton, Olentangy and Upper Arlington were Central Ohio's top performing school districts following the release of the 2012-13 State Report Cards. Controlling Board Hears School Security Grant Request - The Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC) went before the Ohio Controlling Board on Monday to get approval for the release of \$12 million in capital funds as part of a new program created in the budget.

The commission said the funding will go towards providing grants under the new school building security grant program that was authorized under HB59 (Amstutz). The program allows schools to seek reimbursement for up to \$2,000 per school building for emergency radios and up to \$5,000 per building for entrance security measures. Those measures may include security cameras, an intercom and remote access equipment.

Already, local schools have sought grants for about 1,000 buildings. According to the request from the OFCC, the grants cannot be used to pay for operating expenses or personnel, such as school resource officers.

Hamilton is in the process of completed and submitted a school building security grant. These funds, if approved, will add to the security measures, procedures, and equipment purchased and installed with local funds.

U.S. Department of Education Early Learning Update - On November 13, Secretary Duncan joined members of Congress, business, law enforcement, and military leaders, teachers, parents, and students to announce the introduction of a bipartisan early learning bill. The Strong Start for America's Children Act, sponsored by Senator Tom Harkin (D-IA) and Representatives Miller (D-CA) and Hanna (R-NY), builds on the framework laid out by President Obama in his 2013 State of the Union address and Fiscal Year 2014 budget proposal. It focuses on four critical goals: boosting funding for high-quality

preschool programs serving four-year-olds from low- and moderate-income families; increasing the quality of infant and toddler care offered by providers; supporting broad-scale quality improvements to child care programs; and encouraging continued support for the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) program.

This legislation would establish a new federal-state partnership with formula funding for four-year-old preschool -- with a state match -- to all eligible states, based on each state's proportion of four-year-olds under 200% of the federal poverty level.~States would make subgrants to high-quality, local providers, including school districts and community partners, such as child care and Head Start. The legislation also authorizes Prekindergarten Development Grants to help support state and local initiatives. *Reported by Adam Honeysett, U.S. Department of Education-Office of Communications and Outreach*.

College Initiative - As part of our HS Postsecondary Action Planning to: *Help more students pursue postsecondary education through local college access programs, financial aid advising, scholarship and grant availability advising, career guidance, and other services,* On Tuesday, Mrs. Steele, Ms. White, Ms. Stevens, and Mr. Thompson chaperoned a group of 45 Hamilton seniors interested in Capital University and Columbus State Community College for a campus visit. Students had to submit an application to attend the campus visit and express in a statement why they feel they should be chosen for the field trip. Students' interest in the Capital University and Columbus State, their attendance, academic standing (both past and present) and discipline record were all taken into consideration when determining the roster for the field trip.

The program at each college included an admission overview that highlighted the academics and activities offered at both institutions, as well as the application process for admission. OFFICE OF ALTERNATIVE PROGRAMS

Hamilton Alternative Riding for Knowledge - Students sometimes have trouble staying focused and awake while at school. So the Alternative Academy has done some research to rectify the problem and is allowing students to ride stationary bicycles while reading their coursework. Clemson University started a new study, led by Dr. June Pilcher, to see if students really learn better while active on Fit Bikes. Dr. Pilcher believes "while exercising, our brains work better and students are able to think more clearly and remember more information when they are active. Even though your brain is trying to be active while studying, your body is still and unmoving. This causes confusion in the brain and limits brain potential."

Naperville Central High School in Illinois is finding positive results since adding stationary bikes in the classrooms. Reading scores have nearly doubled, and math scores are up "by a factor of 20," ABC News reported. Harvard Medical School professor John Ratey has written extensively on the subject, saying exercise makes the human brain "more ready to learn." It will be interesting to see the effect that incorporating physical fitness has on success in school for the Alternative Academy students. The added benefit of extra physical fitness makes it an effort worth investigating.

DEPARTMENT OF TECHNOLOGY

High School Science Goes Technical - The High School Science Department has taken full advantage of technology in their instruction.

Teachers are using Google Apps for Education as a way to easily share course materials and assignments with their students, in addition to using it as a tool to collaborate-digitally. The teachers also use Google Apps as a platform for virtual meetings and professional development/collaboration with their colleagues.

Ms. Avery has also been utilizing the handheld SMART Response Interactive Response Systems to provide immediate feedback on student understanding of the content. The handheld devices are being used to digitally deliver quizzes/tests/assessments--which provide students with a means to show what they know using technology as a tool, as opposed to paper and pencil. These handheld devices provide valuable immediate insight into student understanding of the content, which allow teachers to adapt their lessons, based on how students respond. It also provides students insight into their own understanding, so they are better informed of their strengths and weaknesses in the course.

The science department also uses a cart of iPads loaded with many science "apps" that not only enhance learning, but make it exciting and fun, as well. Teachers and students also have the ability to collect data within some of the iPad apps while doing labs, and

then they can wirelessly print their results to further analyze and share.

"Science is based on analyzing data, and before the iPads I had to spend a large portion of time dedicated to teaching students how to use a program instead of how to look at their data. Now, it takes me 3 minutes to show them how to graph, fit a curve, and print that I can spend the majority of my classtime working with students on what their data is telling them," says Ms. Avery.

With technology, science at the High School is a cutting edge experience that immerses and allows students to become a part of the learning processes.
