New HTHS Softball Field Still On Schedule For November 2013 Completion - The construction of the new Hamilton Township High School Softball Complex on the corner of Rathmell and Lockbourne Roads is coming along as planned. Here are a few of the latest installations at the facility.

The Ranger Softball Team will be starting a new era under new head coach Samantha Long. The team will open their 2014 season at the new facility on March 29 against Columbus Briggs. Budget Bill 59 requires Hamilton school administrator to certification eligibility for home educated and non-public school students prior to participation in all interscholastic sports - The Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA) distributed and published on July 23, 2013, regarding the Budget Bill 59 and the provisions contained therein, which affects participation opportunities for students, not enrolled in a district and/or attending Hamilton Local Schools.

Nothing in the Budget Bill 59 legislation changes the premise that athletics participation is a PRIVILEGE to be accorded to students who have met the eligibility standards established by the member school principals of the OHSAA. While it will admittedly be more difficult to ascertain eligibility, especially scholastic eligibility, for a student who does not attend Hamilton schools, it must be done in order for the student to have this privilege of participation. This certification process will require the cooperation of the entity, which is providing the education. If the student is home educated, the school administrator must reach out to the individual or entity that is delivering and/or will be evaluating the student's academic work to make arrangements for the submission of grades or progress reports (pass/fail analysis) at the time when the school's grading periods close. A good time to make arrangements for this process is when the parents and students arrive at the school for the mandatory pre-season meeting, which is required for participation in all interscholastic sports.

In order to assess scholastic eligibility for a student enrolled in high school, the "credit hour" and duration of the course (e.g. 9 week, semester, full academic year) are critical to the analysis of "five one credit courses or the equivalent." If a student completes a yearlong course "early," that course may not be used to determine eligibility for future grading periods.

In addition to the scholastic assessment, the Hamilton school administrator must review with the parents the need to provide reliable data on which to evaluate the OHSAA age, semester, residence and transfer bylaws. In short, before a home-educated student's name can be added to an eligibility certificate, the school administrator must be certain that all standards, that are applicable to all other students, have been met.

For students who attend a non-public school, the certification process should be easier. Again, the Hamilton administrator must reach out to the principal or other head administrator of the non-public school to insure that the student's records are forwarded to the Hamilton school and that grades will be provided based on the public school's grading periods. What might be most difficult to ascertain about scholastic eligibility is the eligibility of a home-educated student (and even a student attending a non-public school) who comes to you as a first time participant during the first grading period of the fall. The OHSAA does not permit summer school or "extended time" to be given a student beyond a grading period to "restore" scholastic eligibility. Work completed after a grading period will often be reflected on the previous grading period's grade report. You should be cognizant of when work was completed when assessing eligibility in the fall or eligibility for a student who was not on your roster at the end/beginning of a grading period.

Graduation Requirements Update From State Board Of Education October

Meeting - Sasheen Phillips, executive director, Center for Curriculum and Assessment, gave a graduation requirements update to the board. After giving a brief summary of the requirements, she said that when students earn a 2.0 or lower on the test, they will be able to retake the test as long as they receive remediation from the district. It is understood that when retakes are taken, the highest score will be counted. The intent of the retakes is for students who are moving towards graduation. "You cannot earn points towards

awards or recognition based on scores from a retake, only the first test result," Phillips stated. Within the credit flexibility legislation, districts could adapt their policy to include end of course tests.

"Other End of Course exams could be used to fulfill graduation requirements," Phillips noted, "and these would include AP exams." With regard to weighted exams, districts can decide on the number of exams required; they could omit one math or one English language arts areas. ODE would "weight" the exams so that students could still earn the number of points they need toward graduation.

Phillips said that Alternative Demonstration of Proficiency would include SAT or ACT exams or Career-Tech assessments.

A Diploma Endorsement Board, she continued, would determine other academic endorsement and recognition opportunities. This would also include honors recognition and high level of academic achievement students can earn and would be phased in.

Next steps including feedback to achieve individual student needs will take place next month at the full Board meeting. There will be a presentation of the Graduation Requirement proposal at that time.

Phillips reported on the Proposed Graduation Requirements Transition Plan. The class of 2017 will take the end-of-course exams and there will be a transition to the class of 2019. The class of 2020 will take all ten exams.

Health and Safety - Ohio immunization law (ORC 3313.671) requires children to meet state immunization requirements for continued school attendance. The Ohio Department of Health has revised the School Immunization Requirements to include a dose of Td or Tdap to be administered before a student enters the seventh grade. Record of immunizations must be provided to our middle school or your child is subject to exclusion. Please contact Mrs. Kathy Brickey, School Nurse, immediately with questions or concerns.

With the passage of HB 59 in June 2013, the School Security Grant Program was established to benefit school districts across the state. The School Security Grant Program is being administered by the Ohio School Facilities Commission (OSFC) and authorizes OSFC to reimburse public schools, including community schools, for:

- Up to \$2,000 for one emergency communications system or Multi-Agency Radio Communications System (MARCS) In-School unit per eligible school building; and
- Up to \$5,000 for costs incurred with a purchase of a security entrance system consisting of a door, security camera, an intercom and remote access equipment for one entrance per eligible school building.

Mr. Morrison participated in an ODE sponsored webinar on Wednesday to review the requirements and procedures for apply for this grant.

Transportation - Our district administrators have completed another random bus count to confirm student numbers being transported. Mr. Morrison reviews these counts to confirm cost effective use of our buses. Bus counts allow us to make corrections to routes to better serve our students and families and to better serve our community by keeping our transportation department efficient and effective.

End of First Term - The end of the first grading period is Thursday, October 17. Report cards will be issued on Friday, October 25.

Student Teachers & Observers - Our district has frequent requests from teacher training programs to place students in our classrooms. These programs recognize that we have outstanding teachers, strong academics, and safe schools that can provide their teacher interns with good models of practice. Prior to accepting these students we require written agreements with the teacher training institutions that specify the responsibilities of their institution and our district. In addition, teacher interns must have completed background checks. Once an agreement is in place and a request for placement has been made, our teachers can choose whether or not to host a student. Universities compensate the district for placements in the form of fee scrip (tuition waivers) that our teachers can use to further their education.

iPads for MS Algebra - Hamilton Local Schools is implementing a new 1-1 iPad program in Mrs. Morbitzer's Middle School Algebra 1 class. Students in Algebra 1 will each receive their own iPad for use with coursework relating to their class. Students in this class learn in a blended flipped setting. With the blended classroom, Mrs. Morbitzer teaches at the Middle School a couple days a week, but on the other days, Mrs. Morbitzer teaches from the iPads. She creates videos on the Algebra 1 content and loads them on the interactive online website, Schoology. The students watch the videos on their own and then use apps like Schoology to communicate and complete assignments posted by Mrs. Morbitzer. The iPads are also equipped with numerous math apps, as well as note-taking and sharing apps to enhance the learning experience.
