#### Superintendent's Weekly Wrap-up: Oct. 11-17, 2013

**State Education Officials Recognize Hamilton Township High as a High-Performing School** - The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) Wednesday recognized Hamilton Township High School as a School of Promise. To be named a School of Promise, an Ohio school must have a 75 percent or better average proficiency rate on the Ohio Achievement Assessments and Ohio Graduation Tests for the 2012-2013 school years. In addition, they must reach that 75 percent threshold in two subgroups; an A or B grade for their annual measurable objective (AMO) for narrowing performance gaps between groups of students on the local school report card; an A, B or C progress grade on the local school report card; and a graduation rate of A or B. The schools must also serve 40 percent or more economically disadvantaged students.

"A School of Promise Designation is just one example of what can occur when principals, teachers, students, parents and community members all believe that success can be achieved when accountability and high expectations are commonplace," said Christopher Lester, District Superintendent.

Hamilton Local Schools expected to receive teacher Value-Added data by Nov. 14 -Statistical Analysis System (SAS) is expected to release the teacher-level Value-Added reports for 2012-2013 on Education Value-Added Assessment System (EVAAS) on the <u>EVAAS website</u> by Nov. 14. As with the release of each Value-Added report, administrators will receive an automated email from EVAAS that will include existing username and login information needed to access these reports. In addition, accounts are automatically created for teachers receiving a Value-Added report and they will also receive their login information from EVAAS when the teacher reports are available.

Hamilton Local School Board President Jankowski and Vice President Hallum to attend state convention as delegates - More than 600 public school boards from around the state will be represented at the Annual Business Meeting of the Ohio School Boards Association (OSBA) Delegate Assembly on Nov. 11. During the August meeting of the Hamilton Local Board of Education, the Board named Board President Mr. Joseph Jankowski as the Hamilton delegate to the Annual Business Meeting and Board Vice President Mrs. Pamela Hallum as the Alternate Delegate.

The delegates will consider the OSBA legislative platform, a comprehensive document that defines OSBA's views and goals on a wide spectrum of education issues. The delegate meeting is a key event of the 58th annual OSBA Capital Conference and Trade Show, to be held at the Greater Columbus Convention Center from Nov. 10-13.

Administrative Meetings - Mr. Morrison met with the district's Assistant Principals, HTHS Dean of Students Matt Thompson and Alternative Academy Director Allyson Price to review alternative academy issues, expulsion hearing procedures, residency, attendance and disciplinary issues, building and district phone trees, free and reduced lunch programs and residency affidavits on Thursday, October 17. #### **OFFICE OF THE TREASURER**

**Summer Electric Savings** - Over the summer, our district implemented four-day work weeks (10 hrs per day). We adopted this schedule in an effort to save our community tax dollars and be even more fiscally responsible. Our estimations were that we would save more than \$9,000 by doing this practice. We recently received the savings report from our summer months and the total savings was more than \$27,000! Needless to say, this TRIPLED our expected savings!

**Five-year forecast approved -** At the October 14th Board meeting the district's new five-year financial forecast was approved. Based on projections, we will not be asking for money from the community anytime in the foreseeable future. At the end of 2018, our district is projected to have more than \$7 million in the bank. This forecast shows that our district will be more than a quarter century since needing to pass an operating levy. You can review the story published in the Columbus Dispatch earlier this year about our district's financial strength.

### HAMILTON TOWNSHIP HIGH SCHOOL

**3D Chair Design Project -** Students worked in groups of 4 or 5 to create a sculptural chair made out of cardboard. Teams worked together to design, build, paint, and accessorize their chair. All chairs had to have a theme and have attributes that go along with that theme.

Concepts for the project:

1. Recycle/Re-Use/Repurpose: Each chair was made of recycled cardboard and detailed mainly with repurposed materials we had in the art room or the students brought in.

2. 21st Century Skills:

a. <u>Critical Thinking and Problem Solving:</u> Students worked in a small group dynamic to creatively problem solve.

b. <u>Communication, Collaboration, Leadership and Responsibility</u>: Each group delegated responsibilities to make sure each member is equally productive and to use the strengths of each group member.

c. <u>Interdisciplinary Themes:</u> Physics review of trusses and other support structures to stabilize the chair to support the weight of a human.

d. <u>Creativity and Innovation</u>: Each group decided on a Theme and used multi-media to give their chair attributes that went along with the Theme.

e. <u>Productivity and Accountability:</u> To maximize productivity, group members generally worked on different parts that had to be put together after each was finished, each student was accountable for their part.

**Spanish Students Order Junior's Tacos -** Students in Spanish levels 1-4 celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month with a visit from Junior's Tacos, a taco truck located at 5th Ave and Highland Ave near the Short North. Students ordered authentic Mexican food in Spanish (tacos, burritos, quesadillas and Jarritos, a Mexican soda).

This experience was enjoyable for students and addressed the following content standards:

Interpersonal Communication: Use common expressions to make requests. Use language to acquire goods and services

Culture: Attend, view or participate in cross-cultural activities and target culture events. Identify and use appropriate levels of formality when interacting with a member of the target culture.

### HAMILTON MIDDLE SCHOOL

**8th Graders Measure Up! -** Students in Mrs. Beeker's and Mrs. Maneff's math classes measure up for scatter plots! The students measured and recorded their height (in inches) and length of their foot (in inches). With their data and the data from 10 other students in class, they plotted their ordered pairs on graph paper. Students examined the graph to see if there was an association between height and foot length. This activity assisted students

in constructing and interpreting scatter plots for bivariate measurement data and they investigated patterns of association between two quantities.

**Post-Secondary Action Plan -** As part of the Middle School's Post-Secondary Action Plan, all 8th grade students took the ACT EXPLORE test on October 17, 2013. EXPLORE is designed to help 8th and 9th graders explore a broad range of options for their future. It prepares students not only for their high school coursework but for their post–high school choices as well.
