Budget Bill 59 and ORC 3313.537 allows home schooled and non-public students to participate in extracurricular activities in the parents' residential district - The Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA) distributed and published on July 23, 2013, regarding the Budget Bill 59 and the provisions contained therein, which affects participation opportunities for students, not enrolled in a district and/or attending Hamilton Local Schools.

The Budget Bill 59 legislation speaks to "students" regardless of grade level as well as to all "extracurricular activities" as within the meaning of ORC 3313.537. To the extent that most of our focus is on interscholastic athletic competition/participation, OHSAA tends to focus on grades 7-12.

This legislation permits students who are home educated (excused from compulsory attendance by the superintendent of the public school district of residence), and/or those who attend non-public schools that do not offer a specific sport or sports, to have the opportunity to participate in those sports at the public 7-8th grade and/or high school that the student would be entitled to attend under the tuition statute, i.e., the school located in the parents' residential district.

ODE begins implementation of H.B. 59 school-funding provisions - The new formulas and reports tied to state foundation payments will begin changing in October as the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) begins the implementation of H.B. 59 school-funding provisions. The budget bill requires that state foundation payments be based on fiscal year 2013 calculations until September 29, 2013. After September 29, 2013, ODE will base payments on the new fiscal year 2014 formulas.

ODE will continue to make regularly scheduled state foundation payments. October payments for traditional districts and community schools will be based on new fiscal year 2014 formulas.

District Pays Respects To Long-Time Employee - On Friday, September 27, 2013, one of our long-time employees, Mr. Lewis Hatfield, passed away unexpectedly at The Ohio State University Arthur G. James Cancer Hospital. He was known by many as "Lew" or "Louie" and was admired for his youthful energy and work ethic.

Lew was hired into our District in October of 1976 as a high school custodian after a 21-year career and retirement as a Sergeant in the United States Air Force. He worked 37 years in the District in custodial and maintenance positions.

On a personal note, Lew was one of the hardest working, professional, and respectful individuals that I have had the privilege of working with.

Obviously, this is very sad time for family and friends of Lew and our school district. It is important that our Hamilton Local Schools community pull together and assist the Hatfield family with the difficult task of coping with Lew's unexpected passing.

Ohio eTranscript coming to Hamilton - Hamilton Township High School students will soon have a new, free way to send their electronic transcripts swiftly and securely to Ohio colleges and universities, as well as to some out-of-state schools.

Ohio eTranscript is a joint venture of the Ohio Department of Education and the Ohio Board of Regents, partnering with Parchment, a national electronic transcript service. Ohio eTranscript will streamline college admissions by allowing Hamilton students to complete the entire process online. This system is user friendly and should also reduce costs and save time for our high school.

Electronic transcript services benefit our high school counselors, students and parents by:

- Enabling school staff to focus on the more pressing business of educating students;
- Providing schools training and implementation services. Training can be completed in an hour;
- Providing email updates throughout the transcript-delivery process; and
- Allowing transcript requests any time, any day of the year.

Principal Miller and his staff will notify students and parents as soon as the District has access to the Ohio eTranscript system. We are hopeful that this electronic transcript system will benefit our Hamilton students for many years to come.

Mr. Lew Hatfield - I'd like to express my heartfelt condolences to the family and friends of Mr. Lewis Hatfield. I had the privilege of working with Mr. Hatfield over the past twelve years and have never found anyone more dedicated, hard working and respected than Lew. His passing is truly a great loss to our district and this community.

Health and Safety - Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine and Ohio Superintendent of Public Instruction Richard A. Ross today announced that Ohio schools may now begin submitting school safety plans via a secure online portal to help first responders in case of an emergency. The portal is one of the many recommendations included in the Attorney General's School Safety Task Force announced earlier this year. Ohio law requires each Ohio school to submit school floor plans and safety plans to the Ohio Attorney General's Office. The plans are placed on the Ohio Law Enforcement Gateway (OHLEG) so they can be used by law enforcement and first responders in case of an emergency. Mr. Morrison is working with Obetz Chief of Police Ken Hinkle to prepare for this grant opportunity as well as other safety and security opportunities.

Ohio immunization law (ORC 3313.671) requires children to meet state immunization requirements for continued school attendance. The Ohio Department of Health has revised the School Immunization Requirements to include a dose of Td or Tdap to be administered before a student enters the seventh grade. Record of immunizations must be provided to our middle school or your child is subject to exclusion. Please contact Mrs. Kathy Brickey, School Nurse, immediately with questions or concerns.

Student Information Services - Next week (October 7 - 11) is "October Count Week". This is the week that the state uses attendance data to determine funding for public schools.
