Superintendent's Weekly Wrap-up: Aug. 23-30, 2013

Student Attendance Counts - Each school year at the end of the first three full weeks of the school year, the Superintendent conducts Actual Attendance Counts for each building, program, and grade level in the District. Our second of the three student attendance counts was completed today. The District uses these student numbers to determine the most effective and efficient staffing and student placement throughout the District.

Our week-two counts indicate that we have experienced some growth at the 1st and 5th grades. These concerns are currently being addressed with the addition of a 1st grade teacher and a 5th grade teacher. Our preschool enrollment has also grown by approximately 50 students due to the addition of an Half Day AM/PM Two Days Per Week Program.

Ohio to Receive Funds to Help Cover Cost of AP Tests for Low-Income Students - The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) will receive \$327,846 under a program announced Tuesday by the U.S. Department of Education to cover a portion of the fees charged to low-income students for taking advanced placement (AP) tests. Nationally, more than \$28.8 million will be distributed to 42 states.

Based on the anticipated number of test-takers and other factors, grants under the Advanced Placement Test Fee Program are expected to be sufficient to pay all but \$10 of the cost of each advanced placement exam taken by low-income students. States may opt to require students to pay a portion of the costs.

"This administration has taken unprecedented steps to boost college- and career readiness for our young people, especially first-generation college goers," U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan said in a statement. "Participation in Advanced Placement courses gives these students a jump start in college by challenging them to develop stronger study and critical-thinking skills. These grants will eliminate some financial roadblocks and enable more minority students to gain access to rigorous AP courses, which will help them succeed in today's knowledge economy."

By subsidizing test fees for low-income students, the program is intended to encourage those students to take AP tests and obtain college credit for high school courses, reducing the time and cost required to complete a postsecondary degree.

The grants can be used to help pay for low-income students taking approved AP tests administered by the College Board, the International Baccalaureate Organization, and Cambridge International Examinations. Levels of funding per state were determined on the basis of state estimates of the numbers of tests that would be taken by low-income students. *Originally reported by Focus Education. New exams will replace the Ohio Graduation Test (OGT) - The State Board of Education's Graduation Committee gave preliminary approval Wednesday to its recommendations on changing requirements for Ohio students to earn a diploma, including options for some districts to administer slightly fewer end-of-course exams and the creation of a new board to bless career credentials.

The committee unanimously voted to direct the Ohio Department of Education to draft a report based on the recommendations, including any changes to state law or administrative rules necessary to implement the proposal. The report will be submitted to the full board for its September meeting in advance of a possible vote in October.

The graduation requirements are built around a series of 10 end-of-course exams -- three each in English and math, and two each in history and science -- based on the Common Core and Ohio Core education standards. New exams will replace the Ohio Graduation Test (OGT). Exam scores will correspond to points earned toward graduation, with 25 points needed to graduate. The new proposal also requires a minimum number of points in each of the four subject areas; achieving only the minimum score for proficiency on all tests would not be sufficient for graduation.

The new tests are set to debut in the 2016-2017 school year, though absent the change in state law the board is seeking, schools will be required to administer the OGT that year as well.

The proposal also allows school districts to identify tests that serve as alternatives to the end-of-course exams, such as Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate tests.

Also included is permissive authority for local districts to offer eight end-of-course exams instead of 10, enabling them to administer two math and English tests instead of three. To reconcile that change with the 25-point graduation scoring system, exam scores would be weighted 50 percent more for districts administering two tests. Districts making this change would have to administer the second and third tests in the math and English sequences, not the first and second.

Those later endorsements would need to meet three requirements: that they qualify a person for a full-time job; that the job can serve as a career; and that the endorsement can serve as the basis for further credentials or degrees.

Rod has also played a major role in supporting our youth athletic programs. The Hall of Fame Committee also recognized Mark Tyler, our current Hamilton Elementary Principal and former head track & field coach. HAMILTON TOWNSHIP HIGH SCHOOL

Preparing Students for College - As part of our HS Postsecondary Action Planning to: Help more students pursue postsecondary education through local college access programs, financial aid advising, scholarship and grant availability advising, career guidance, and other services, the HS Social Studies team has introduced a new AP Government Class (Lecture Style) located in the HS Auditorium with the top 50 AP juniors and 50 AP seniors. This large classroom setting is to prepare our students for the college setting and high expectations. AP Government is led by Team Teachers Lanthorn and O'Hearn.

HTHS Executes Perfect Fire Drill – The state requires school districts to perform and practice evacuation, tornado and other safety drills throughout the school year in preparation of an event should a school have to evacuate during the regular school day. During the first two weeks of the school year, HTHS practiced this drill. Perfectly executed drills include silent evacuation and complete organization. Once the attendance count is confirmed 100% accurate, students may filter back into the building and directly back to class. HAMILTON MIDDLE SCHOOL

High School Credit at the MS - Some students attending Hamilton Middle School this year could have the possibility of leaving the building with 40% of the credits they need to become sophomores in high school. In addition to the Algebra 1 class that was taught here last year, students now have the opportunity to earn—a credit of Health and—a credit of Personal Finance, both classes being taught by high school licensed teachers. While the Algebra 1 students were selected using performance criteria and teacher recommendations, Health was a general elective, open to any 8th grade student taking electives, and Personal Finance is being offered to second-year, high-performance, Computer Applications students. During the first two weeks of the year, all students taking High School classes are off to an incredible start.

HAMILTON INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL

Speeding Ahead With Ranger Pride - Taylor Murphy is a sixth grader at the Intermediate school. Last winter she joined the ASPO (Adapted Sport Program of Ohio), where she learned the fundamentals of wheelchair racing. After learning about wheelchair racing, she decided to join the Hamilton Intermediate Track Club. Her goal is to be the first Hamilton Ranger wheelchair racer to win a State Championship. This summer she had her first race against other wheelchair athletes at the ASPO Excel Games. She won 1st place in all the races in her class! Her personal record times are 100m 27.0, 200m 53.03, 400m 1.53. She also won 2nd place in the shot put and discus events.

Thanks to the change in rules from the OHSAA, disabled athletes are finally allowed to

participate with their fellow able-bodied athletes on a school track team. Taylor will be able to be on the Hamilton Ranger track team next year in the seventh grade. She is looking forward to being part of her school team and to proudly represent the Rangers. She said, "I will be able to be on my school team with my friends, wearing the same uniform, doing the same thing. I just have to do it a different way." Taylor is looking forward to track club this spring. She also said, "I love the feeling I get when I am on the track."
