Superintendent's Weekly Wrap-up: Aug. 22-29, 2014

Update on Ohio's New High School Graduation Requirements - Ohio House Bill 487 recently established new requirements for earning a high school diploma in Ohio. Summary:

- The new graduation requirements take effect with the class of 2018 students who are entering ninth grade for the first time in the 2014-2015 school year.
- Students in the classes of 2015, 2016 and 2017 and those who are repeating ninth grade this school year will continue to operate under Ohio's current graduation requirements, including taking the Ohio Graduation Tests in the spring of their 10th-grade years.
- Required courses The new requirements did not change the current courses or number of course credits that students must complete to be eligible for graduation. View that information here.
- Assessments In addition to course credits, students must earn points toward graduation on seven end-of-course exams. These exams will replace the Ohio Graduation Tests.
- The courses in which students take an end-of-course exam will be:
 English I and II, algebra I, geometry, integrated math I and II, physical science, American history and American government.
- Districts have the option to use the state end-of-course exams to replace their current course final exams and use the state's test as part of the class grade. This will help avoid double testing in future years.
- Graduation points
- The State Board of Education has not yet approved the minimum number of points a student must accumulate to become eligible for a high school diploma.
- The Board's Graduation Requirements Committee will propose 18 points as the minimum for graduation eligibility. Of those points, students must earn a minimum of four total points across the English end-of-course exams, four total points across the math exams, and six total points across the science and social studies exams.
- More flexibility for students and families Students who do not earn the required number of graduation points can still meet the requirements for a diploma if they earn a remediation-free score on a national college admission test.
- Students also can qualify for graduation by earning an approved industryrecognized credential and achieving a workforce-readiness score on a related job skills assessment.

School Board Looks to Tie Workforce Diploma Pathway to 'In-Demand' Credentials - The State Board of Education's committee on graduation requirements voted Wednesday to recommend that the state recognize training for "in-demand" jobs as one path to earning a high school diploma.

Earning an industry credential and passing a job skill assessment is one of three pathways to a diploma approved in recent mid-biennium review legislation. The other two pathways require earning points based on results of end-of-course exams, or achieving a "remediation-free" score on a college readiness test like the ACT or SAT.

ODE staff presented two options for the committee to consider: holding those students to the same standards as others, which is to earn 18 points across seven tests; or allowing them to meet the standards for late-grade transfer students, who must earn a total of five points across the second English and math exams.

The committee also voted to recognize students' college-readiness exam scores from any administration of the tests, not just the required, state-funded administration in students' junior years.

The committee also voted to set a 2022 cutoff for administration of the Ohio Graduation Test for students who don't graduate on time or are seeking an adult education diploma. *Provided by Focus Education - a service of Hannah News*

Common Core State Standards hearings - Over the past two weeks, the House Rules and Reference Committee considered House Bill (HB) 597, legislation that would eliminate and prohibit Ohio's use of the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). Nearly 50 witnesses offered proponent testimony urging committee members to repeal the standards.

HB 597 contains the following provisions:

- eliminates/prohibits the use of CCSS after the current school year;
- eliminates/prohibits the use of Ohio's Standards for Science and Social Studies (adopted in 2010);
- prohibits the use of PARCC assessments;
- puts in place the Massachusetts Standards for Mathematics, English Language Arts, Science and Social Studies from "pre-CCSS" for two years (2015-16 and 2016-17);
- new Ohio standards in the four subject areas to be developed by the State Board of Education for use beginning with the 2017-18 school year:
- institutes a legislative steering committee to review any new proposed state standards;
- replaces the recently passed seven end-of-course exams (in HB 487) with five end-of-course exams required before graduation; and,

- contains unprecedented specificity on what the standards for each subject area should include.

Once the attendance count is confirmed 100% accurate, students may filter back into the building and directly back to class.
